The Agricultural Land Equity Initiative (ALEI) works to equitably increase agricultural land access across California for food and fiber production and traditional tribal agricultural uses. ALEI staff administer and support the California Agricultural Land Equity Task Force (Task Force).

### California Agricultural Land Equity Task Force

The Task Force is made up of thirteen appointed members working together to identify and address barriers and opportunities to equitably increase agricultural land access and stable tenure for Native American tribes and socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers\* in California. The members will submit a report to the legislature and Governor by Jan. 1, 2026 that includes their recommendations on how to address the agricultural land equity crisis. # Why Does Agricultural Land Equity Matter?

Stable and secure access to agricultural land in California is fundamental for tribal sovereignty and success as a farmer or rancher. Native American tribes and socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers\* in California from many backgrounds have faced centuries of systemic discrimination, displacement and dispossession of their land. The **2022 USDA Census of Agriculture** shows that 86% of farms in California are owned by white producers. In this context, progress towards more equitable land access is a critical component of Strategic Growth Council's efforts to address inequities and advance a California for all.
