In addition to improvements to bike lanes and sidewalks throughout the Project Area that would increase safety for bicyclists and pedestrians, 3 Muni bus routes would have increased reliability due to the construction of transit-only lanes, transit bulbs and islands, and new traffic signals. A blighted right of way would be converted into public open space available for the broader community.

The development would also include a workforce development center operated by the County. The Project's transportation improvements would include an upgrade of over 2.6 miles of bike lanes and 2.8 miles of walkways and street crossings, and the construction of a 2,700 foot permeable walking path throughout Franklin D. Roosevelt Park. Amenities to encourage use of active transportation options would include the planting of 42 street trees, installation of wayfinding signage, street lighting, and upgrades to or installation of over 15 bus shelters.
