The TCC Program funds community-led development and infrastructure projects that achieve major environmental, health, and economic benefits in California's most disadvantaged communities.

Purpose/Goal of Program

The CRC Program funds the planning, development, construction, and upgrades of neighborhood-level community resilience centers, along with services and programs to improve local resilience holistically.

Purpose/Goal of Program

The EHCR Program funds social and physical infrastructure projects that mitigate the impacts of extreme heat on the most heat vulnerable Californians.

Grant Activities

Planning

Building internal and external capacity; streamlining various policies and codes; fiscal impact analysis; preparing climate adaptation plans; designing community engagement plans; partnership development; community needs assessment; feasibility studies

Project Development

Pre-development activities; community engagement; feasibility studies; environmental assessments; development of operations and maintenance plans for infrastructure; acquiring tools and resources to increase partner capacity; access to financial services; securing technical assistance for partners; pilot projects, access to basic environmental infrastructure

Implementation

Multiple, coordinated projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions and achieve other community benefits such as equitable housing, land acquisition, transit access, mobility, solar installation, energy/water efficiency, urban greening, community microgrids and health & well-being activities

Grant Activities

Planning

Partnership development; community needs assessments; feasibility studies; site assessments; permitting; fiscal impact analysis; updating climate action plans; designing community engagement plans

Implementation

New construction and/or upgrades of Community Resilience Centers facilities, Campus Amenities that support use of the facility, and services and programs that build overall community resilience.

Grant Activities

Early Transformative

Early transformative projects have both planning and implementation components. Early projects dedicate more funding toward planning but must include a physical infrastructure demonstration project.

Advanced Transformative

Advanced transformative projects are physical infrastructure implementation projects with a smaller planning component focused on long-term planning beyond infrastructure completion.

Activities reduce the impacts of extreme heat through:

Planning; permitting; design; community engagement; placemaking/belonging elements; partnership development; construction community engagement; placemaking/belonging elements; partnership development; construction

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Leverage Funding Requirement

- No requirement for Planning or Project Development Grants.
- Implementation Grantees must leverage additional funding sources that equate to at least 50% of total grant award. Tribes are exempt from this requirement.

Funding goals

- Award one Implementation Grant to a qualifying Tribally led project.
- Award one Project Development Grant to a qualifying project in a disadvantaged unincorporated community.

Funding goals

- Award 1 Planning Grant and 1 Implementation Grant to qualifying Tribally led project.
- Award projects that represent statewide geographic diversity.

Funding goals

 Funding goals determined by Proposition 4 guidance, forthcoming.

Grant terms

- Planning Grant: 2 years
- Project Development Grant: 2 years
- Implementation Grant: 1-year Pre-Development Phase, 4-year Implementation Phase, 1-year Evaluation Phase

Grant terms

- Planning Grant: 2 years
- Implementation Grant: 4 years project completion period, 1 year performance period

Grant terms

- Early Transformative: Up to 30 months
- Advanced Transformative Grants: Up to 30 months

Timeline

- Fall 2025: Release Draft Guidelines for public comment
- Spring/Summer 2026: Applications open
- First half of 2027: Awards

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Engagement

During the upcoming Fall 2025 Public Comment period for R6 Draft Guidelines, staff will host community input sessions, with tailored outreach to priority populations including disadvantaged unincorporated communities and Tribes.

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Engagement

EHCR hosted 10 community-input sessions though August 2025 to collect early feedback on program objectives, priorities, and overall design. Staff will host additional engagement opportunities to share the outcomes of the community input sessions.
